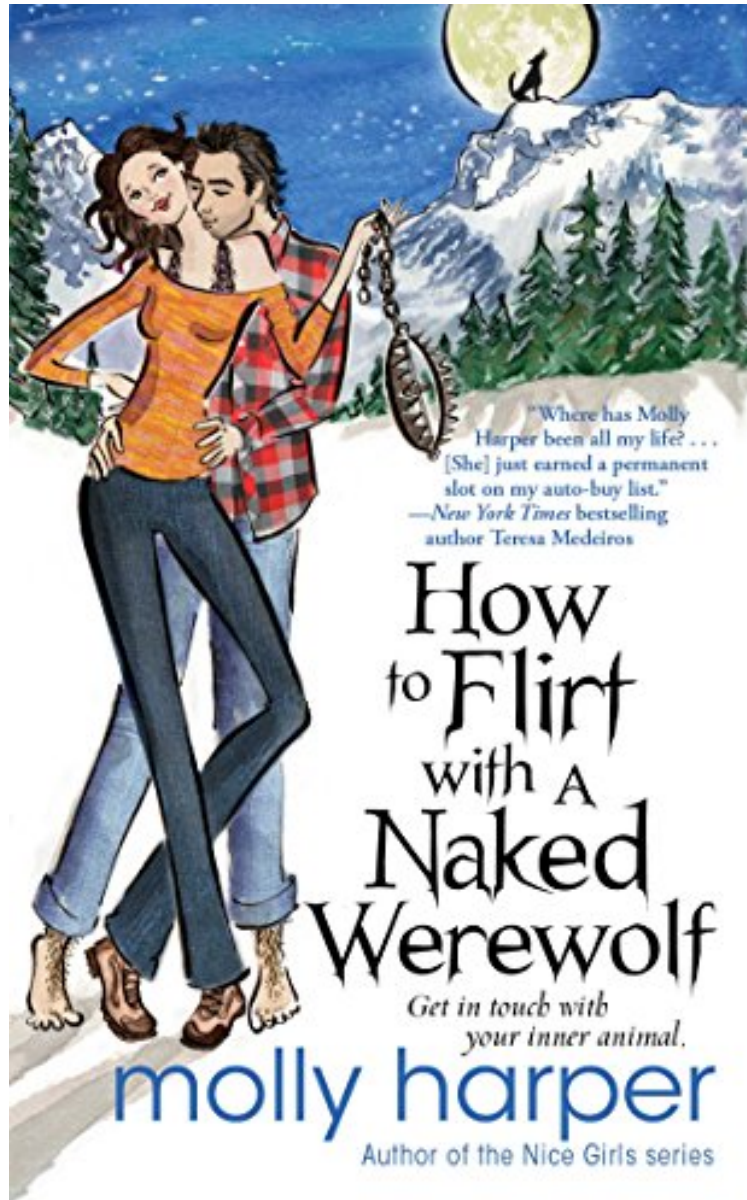

But let's start by talking about the things I liked: COOPER! ^.^ He is such a great, arrogant, surly, but strangely endearing guy. He's sexy, he loves his family and Mo and his territorial behavior cracked me up every single time. The way the author portrayed his character was awesome, but he has enough faults and annoying habits to keep him from getting too perfect. Then there's Mo. She is a funny and likable person. Her thoughts and comments are hilarious and often had me crying, I was laughing so hard. Although I have to say that her behavior and some of her actions in this book are the reason for the missing star in my rating. I will come back to that later on in my review. Another enjoyable part of the book was the Grundy community. The way the people of the "city" took Mo under their wings was really sweet. I liked the interactions within the community, as well as all the eccentric personalities. Oh, and have I mentioned that the book is hilarious? Well, it bears repeating. I can't remember the last time I laughed so much while reading a book. In some of the funnier books I have read, the love story suffered from all the humor, since some of the scenes ended up being ridiculous or painfully embarrassing. This wasn't the case in "How To Flirt With A Naked Werewolf". The humor in this book was dry, sarcastic and good-natured. But even though I enjoyed myself immensely while reading this book, there were still a few things that bothered me: The whole Alan debacle. I liked Alan. I just didn't like the way Mo acted around and with him. She was giving him mixed signals for the entire book! At first she's heavily flirting and going on dates with him and even lets him kiss her (at one point she even talks about sleeping with him TO HIM!) and then suddenly, without a single word she jumps into bed with Cooper and starts a relationship with him. I'm sorry, but that's just cruel, rude and completely wrong! If a man did that everyone would be calling him a cheating bastard, but with Mo nobody even bats an eyelash (with the exception of Alan, of course). That are some heavy double standards and I just wasn't okay with it. But even after she got together with Cooper, Mo stayed her old flirting and smiling self. I'm not saying that she should completely ignore Alan or be rude to him, but I just think it's cruel to treat him as if nothing happened or as if he still had a chance with her, because that's exactly how it looked to me (and obviously to Alan as well, otherwise he wouldn't have kept on pursuing her). ***SPOILER *** I mean just look at the way she let him kiss her when Cooper was away. That was horrible - to Cooper and to Alan. Yes, she stopped him after some heavy reasoning in her head, but it still bothered me A LOT. ***SPOILER END*** Be aware, some more spoilers ahead. If you are bothered by them you might want to skip the entire next paragraph and go straight to the end of my review. Then there's the thing with Cooper's disappearance. Yes, I can understand that Mo was hurt, I would have been as well, but the way she blew it completely out of proportion annoyed me to no end. He didn't leave you because he had enough of you or because you were pregnant (he didn't even know about that). He left because he was afraid to hurt you and seeing how there was a strong possibility that he was responsible for all the seriously injured residents of Grundy I think that was a wise decision. He was afraid FOR YOU and I don't see how staying and talking about it reasonably would have helped in that situation. So get over yourself already. He came back the moment he found out about your condition. But as if that wasn't enough, there was some more drama ahead. Instead of being happy about Cooper coming back, Mo started bitching about him coming back, only because of the baby. That did it for me. At first she's all: "Oh he's leaving me alone with his child" and then when he's back, even that's not good enough for her. If I remember correctly his first words have been something like: "Missed you. Love you.", so I don't see how he could have come back only because of Mo's pregnancy. Talk about a drama queen. The whole scenario seemed a bit too fabricated to me. As if the author had to force herself to bring some difficulties into their relationship. But apart from that I absolutely loved this book. It's funny, heart-warming and quite suspenseful towards the end! And now that I look at my review I see, that I spent a lot more time talking about the things I didn't like, than I did about the things I enjoyed, but don't be confused, it's a great book (it's just that it's a lot easier to complain about things ;P). And even though I loved this book so much, I'm still a bit suspicious of book #2 in the series, since the female protagonist will be Maggie, Cooper's sister. Review This is a real fun read that I finished in half a day. After reading a lot of Urban and Dark Fantasy, this was like a vacation for my mind: you know, even with a portion of angst and action, there will not be unsolvable obstacles. This does not mean that there is only the romance part, which would be annoying, but actually this is a lot about Mo's character-growth, her way to become her own woman, who has to let go of a lot of emotional baggage. That is exceptional with PNR, since they tend to just sketch the characters and focus totally on the relationship between hero and heroine. Make no mistake, there is a lot of focus on relationships, but not just between Cooper and Mo, but Mo's with a lot of people in the small town Grundy and her parents and friend at home. The thorough [and entertaining] description of all the different characters made me feel as if I know them, they felt very alive and real to me. Actually, I found myself wishing, I could just move to Grundy and live with the bunch of crazies [I felt reminded of the movie "New in town" with Renee Zellweger or the "Men in trees"-series]. The actual development of Mo and Cooper's relationship is hilarious and I liked that there was instant attraction, but not insta-love and fate and stuff. They do get to know each other and it's so totally understandable in the end, why they would fall for each other [and: I love Ms. Harper for not doing the love-triangle-thing, although she could have]. The background-story of the disappearances of hikers, the wolf-attacks and stuff, is really just that: a background for the relationships and Mo's personal development. That is ok, since it's not boring and gives impulses to move the relationships forward a step at a time. The same goes for the werewolf explanation: there isn't a really developed alternate-world or explications how or why they came to be or how it works and stuff. There are just packs and that's it. But, as with the framework-giving story, that does not really matter for the fun I had reading this book. It just does, what it attempts to: very well written romantic entertainment with a paranormal touch. I will continue to read the "Naked Werewolf"-series. For fun.
